#### **Antiques & Collectables Group**

The Group's last three meetings have been on quite contrasting topics which have featured some fascinating antique objects as well as local history.

In May we finally welcomed Michael Brown (aka the Historic Gardener). He was originally booked to speak to us before the lockdown but was further delayed when he caught the dreaded covid bug and then the Coronation hijacked our usual second Monday of the month slot! But he was well worth the wait.

A thoroughly knowledgeable professional he gave us his talk on 'The History of Gardening in 100 Objects (or thereabouts)', from the humble dibber to the first lawn mower via Victorian obsessions with killing any living animal (aka pest) in the garden this was a fascinating look at some bygone objects.

In June it was my opportunity to share one of my collecting passions with the group. I collect Visiting Card Cases which seems to be a bit of an overlooked bygone. First of all I gave a brief history about calling/ visiting cards and some of the bizarre and convoluted etiquette surrounding their use during Victorian times. The second part of my talk concentrated on the card cases themselves looking at all the diverse materials, designs and decorations that make this such an interesting hobby (to me anyway!). I had brought along many examples from my collection so the the group was able to get a close look at the exquisite workmanship that had gone into their manufacture.





In July we switched emphasis to local history with a new talk from Jonathan Smith. Jonathan has been the researching the history of one of Bourne's oldest and most interesting buildings, the Red Hall. Originally the home of a wealthy Tudor family it has survived threats of demolition several times over the years whilst serving as the town's railway booking office and now as the base for Bourne United Charities. There are also stories of a ghost!

#### Wine Group 3

Our group is currently tasting one wine from the Old World and one from the New, made with the same type of grape. For our July meeting the host had brought from a visit to Sicily a bottle of Nerello Mascalese, a red wine describing itself as dry, elegant and harmonious. The group was in



agreement that it was dry but the elegance and harmony were a matter for debate and ultimately personal taste. As the Nerello Mascalese, which is a dark skinned grape variety, is only grown on the volcanic slopes of



Mt Etna the host sought the nearest match for the second wine.

Research revealed this to be a Pinot Noir and a bottle was acquired

produced by the family estate of Luis Felipe Edwards in the Leyda Valley, Chile, the only winemaker producing Pinot Noir wine in that country. This wine tasted quite remarkably similar to the first. Despite the grapes having ripened slowly with the cooling ocean breezes of the Leyda Valley and the wine having been aged in French oak barriques, the resulting supple, smoky fruit flavours were not enough

to balance the dominant refreshing acidity, which resulted in an interesting if not entirely popular wine tasting experience.

#### A Trip to Spalding Fen

The Garden Group went on our second visit of the year to a lovely garden in Wragg Marsh, Spalding in June. It is to the home of Colin and Lisa King.

Colin, Lisa and their helpers welcomed us into their kitchen on arrival with a cup of tea to warm up and then showed us the pond with bird baths in it, along with a large cage that the birds can fly in and out of, so that they can be fed safe from predators.

We all agreed that it was one of the best gardens we have been to in terms of planting. It wasn't so much the diversity of planting but the variation and variety of the plants beautifully displayed. We were firstly treated to a full herbaceous border of different plants, featuring varieties of peony. Moving round we came to the first of their rose borders with many unusual varieties, all carefully labelled. We then walked through the trees and shrubs to a large lawn.



In the shade of the trees were

beds of heuchera in many different colours and a hosta bed all beautifully laid out and labelled. We moved on past a long hedge of hydrangea on the right and on the left a poly tunnel to propagate plants and this also shelters a trial garden with a deep spiral meadow. Beyond are the orchard and wildlife garden. To the front of the house is the second rose garden and borders of lavender surrounding a large lawn.



It was a shame the weather was so cold, wet and windy. With better conditions we could have enjoyed more of the garden and learnt more about the birds and wildlife that Colin is very passionate about.

After we were taken round the garden, we were treated to a lovely tea of filled rolls, cakes and scones.


A real treat of a garden enjoyed by all.

#### **Poetry Group**

In midsummer, as the rain pelted down, your Poetry Group met to look at the poetry of Percy Bysshe Shelley (1792-1822) who was a major figure of the English Romantic movement, despite his untimely death at the age of 29. In his short life he made his presence felt as a political radical and scourge of the Establishment, as well as as a vegetarian, an atheist (or pantheist?) and a good friend of Lord Byron and John Keats. He eventually lived (and died) in Italy where he became frustrated by the fact that much of his best work was withheld from publication in England until years after his death. Below is a short poem, 'Love's Philosophy', that was published during his lifetime. Shelley is not easy, but many of his radical ideas have been vindicated by their continuing relevance to our own world.

The fountains mingle with the river And the rivers with the ocean, The winds of heaven mix for ever With a sweet emotion; Nothing in the world is single; All things by a law divine In one spirit meet and mingle. Why not I with thine?—

See the mountains kiss high heaven And the waves clasp one another; No sister-flower would be forgiven If it disdained its brother; And the sunlight clasps the earth And the moonbeams kiss the sea: What is all this sweet work worth If thou kiss not me?

#### Science and Tech Group Meeting July 2023

The Subject of the meeting was: - Moulton Mill, presented by Alan Lambert.

The July meeting was technology from the Victorian age, namely the windmill at Moulton near Spalding that has been restored and in working order within this Grade 1 listed building.

Alan Lambert, who gave the presentation is a retired civil servant who decided to retire to the country and was asked to volunteer to help with the Mill restoration and then found himself running it.

Alan told us the history of the Mill, it was built in 1822 by Robert King, it was a fully functioning windmill, grinding wheat and other products from then until 1890 when the last miller, Mr. J.T.Biggadyke ceased milling. However, on 12 December 1894, the sails were damaged in a great storm and were removed in 1895. Soon afterwards, a steam engine system was installed to power the mill and then in 1924 an oil engine was installed.

A local campaign was established to restore the Grade I listed mill to full working order. In 1998 the Moulton Windmill Project was formed. In 2003, the mill featured on the first series of BBC2's "Restoration" which helped to publicise the restoration, along with many fundraising events has meant that the "Friends of Moulton Mill" campaign has succeeded in raising enough money to restore and refurbish the mill's structure and add a new cap. The new white ogee cap, which weighs at least 12 ton was installed in 2004.Alan enlightened us to some of the



design features within the ogee cap such as using iron gears meshing with wooden gears to reduce the likelihood of sparks because flour dust in the air is explosive. He also proudly pointed out that French millstones were used, this being unusual in Lincolnshire. The French millstones are of a finer texture to the British counterpart and produce a finer flour.

The volunteers used various methods to keep the cost of refurbishment as low as possible and they decided to build the shutters for the sails themselves. The Friends of Moulton Mill have encouraged local people to "sponsor" a shutter to raise further funds.

The Gallery opened on 25<sup>th</sup> August 2008 and the sails refitted in 2011.

The mill is open to the public on weekends and Bank Holidays, unfortunately further opening is not possible at the moment due to the loss of volunteers during and after the pandemic.

The mill features The Granary Tearooms and a shop and make for a pleasant visit. A fine example of how wind power has been used, in this case to directly power a machine as opposed to the ever increasing use to generate electricity as is the modern trend.

One other interesting fact, the mill is 200 years old but has no foundation. Another well-presented and interesting presentation.

#### **Garden Group**

On Tuesday 4<sup>th</sup> July 24 members of the Garden Group visited the Seed Cooperative at Gosberton Bank Nursery. This was a new experience for most of us, recommended by one of our members.

We were met by Sharn Jones, the Manager on quite a cold day and she informed us that the many acres of land were worked by just 5 ladies. I'm going to quote directly from their catalogue to explain what they are trying to do:

'The Seed Co-operative exists to shine a spotlight on the vital, but all-too-often, forgotten role of the humble seed in building a resilient food system. The future of food has to be rooted in democracy, diversity and health. That means diversity of ownership and shared knowledge of genetics and wildlife diversity. We grow, process and sell organic, open-pollinated seed for the UK and develop new varieties through organic plant breeding, to support the collective work of those striving towards making agro-ecological farming and food sovereignty a reality.'

We were split into two groups and taken to look around the fields and the greenhouses and the way of working in each was explained as we wandered around. We were extremely honoured to be allowed into the seed room where we were allowed to buy seeds which were very reasonably priced. The ladies explained that they would need to clean the area after we left to ensure hygiene/lack of contamination to the seeds. Because of this we were not allowed into the freezers where the seeds are stored.

The difference in temperature in the greenhouses was marked but it was pointed out that if it had been a warm day, the greenhouses would have been too hot for us to go into, so we were lucky in our cold and windy day!

The Co-operative was only started in 2017 and are still building up their



stocks. They are in the process of getting some cattle (non milkers) and rescue chickens to help with the organic feeding of the crops.

Everyone enjoyed their day and a lovely tea.

#### Thursday August 17<sup>th</sup> Avoncroft Historic Buildings - £45


