# Chairman's Chat

I sometimes get my leg pulled on the Committee for being, at 67 years old, the youngest member. I quite enjoy being the 'baby' in the U3A although it is a status I am rapidly losing as younger members join. I was, therefore, decidedly miffed when I felt patronised by a young woman cutting my hair last year. She had asked what I was doing for the rest of the day. I replied that I was shopping and mowing the lawn. Her response was, "Ah, Bless". I suppressed an acerbic retort but reflected on society's attitude to older people. How many of us are regarded as 'old dears' or old codgers'? Where do those attitudes come from?

However, when I think about it, I might also be guilty of a degree of ageism. I have often said that we should have a greater number of younger members on the Committee and running Groups. Is it right that members in their sixties are relying on members in their seventies and eighties to organise part of their social lives? As we age we may lose touch with technology changes and the aspirations of younger generations. We may slow down and become set in our ways and unable to run a thriving and dynamic organisation. But that is not inevitable, and I know many U3A members who are sharper and more up to date than lots of younger people.

I do get annoyed when people patronise or dismiss the older generations. They are happy to accept our voluntary work, our caring of grandchildren and elderly parents, our spending and charitable donations so why not give a little respect for the enormous contribution we make to society rather than rely on lazy generalisations. Other societies revere the experience and wisdom that their elders possess, and often benefit from their wise counsel.

Before dismissing anybody over the age of 66 as past it, people should remember that the United States of America have just replaced a 74 year old President with a 78 year old one, while the Speaker of the House of Representatives, Nancy Pelosi, is 80. Gandhi was 78 and still campaigning when he was assassinated, and Winston Churchill was 80 when he finally retired from office in 1955.

With very little effort I am sure you can think of many public figures – not just politicians – who continue to make a valuable contribution to society long after their seventieth birthday. How about David Attenborough (94) or Judi Dench (86)? Perhaps we should compile a list of the over seventies great and the good and publicise it at every opportunity. It might give the ageist youngsters something to think about.

We then walked up the drive to the museum and were given an introductory talk about time and the various clocks we would see. They included one of the oldest clocks which I believe was from the 16th century and a clock which worked by water. Beautiful Grandfather and Grandmother clocks plus clocks of all shapes and sizes. We were all fascinated. Then it was time for lunch so we piled back onto the Coach and went to a restaurant which we had previously visited where we had a most delicious meal.

I had not at the start of this trip told the group where were going so they had to trust my judgement on this Mystery Tour. Our afternoon visit was to the Museum for the Holocaust. Luckily for me most of my members were very interested and joined me inside the building to look at the photographs and remembrances all of which were heart breaking. On arrival however we were all amazed by the beautiful rose bushes each one of which had a plaque by it remembering a specific family. So, so, many beautiful roses. The day was sunny and we had a cup of tea out in the garden with our own memories. Some of us bought a rose to take home which if I remember correctly had the name of Anne Frank. The group has now been running for 10 years and we have had many happy days out but not one was as thought provoking as this one had been.

# **Easter Island**

In December 2019 we were lucky enough to be able to visit Easter Island, called Rapa Nui by locals, as part of a Christmas trip to South America.

At 64 square miles in size, Easter Island is less than half the size of the Isle of Wight. It is the most remote inhabited island in the world and lies in the South Pacific, 2,180 miles from the Chilean coast.

It is most famous for statues called moai that appear all around the island. They can weigh from 10 to 85 tons and many were toppled in the eighteenth and nineteenth centuries as part of inter-tribal warfare. Many have now been restored to their original positions on top of burial mounds called ahus.

Some 8,000 people live on the island and they get almost all their supplies from a regular cargo ship every three or so weeks. It travels back and forth to Valparaiso 2,180 miles away and must be unloaded in the bay because the harbour at Hanga Roa is too small. Most of their food is imported because after centuries of over exploitation the land is very poor.

The island was annexed by Chile in 1888, but the local population were not recognised as Chilean citizens until 1966. There are some grumbles about Chilean rule and there is a small independence movement, but it does not seem to have a lot of support.



Apart from fishing, the islanders rely on tourism and the sale of craft items such as this 'Bird Man' carving that celebrates the cult that replaced the erection of moais in the nineteenth century.
