#### **Science and Tech Group Meeting December 2023**

The meeting held on Tuesday 5th December meeting was our usual pre-Christmas Show and Tell. This year followed by a Christmas Lunch at the Horseshoe in Thurlby.

This was to be the last meeting at St Firmin's Church Hall in Thurlby as it is closing and will be demolished in the New Year.

The Show and Tell is a series of short presentations by members on subjects that interest them and that they can then interest the meeting members.

The first was by Dave Richardson who brought along various artefacts that he had dug up in his garden that included the remains of a jug made in Stamford and various items from our industrial past.

Stuart Goldsmith followed on with the history of the transistor and its integration into computers, giving background of the industry at the time and the emergence of Intel as an industry leader and the intriguing observation made by its CEO, Gordon Moore" that the number of transistors on a microchip doubles every two years, also the speed and capacity will increase and the price will decrease. This is known as "Moors Law". He also observed the growth of microprocessors is expediential. This is trusted well enough that future designs can be planned using this observation.

Next Vaughan Roberts gave an insight to the development of bicycle rear light development over the years that showed some similarities to the previous subject in terms of miniaturisation.

Trevor Horn gave an insight into the development of BS SPEC 7121 that is the standard for safety when lifting items and equipment with mobile cranes. Trevor had worked in the industry and was aware of the complex requirements of moving things with mobile cranes and the documentation required, and some of the shortcomings of the past before proper standards were applied.

This was followed by Ian Tanners card trick, no Science and Tech pre-Christmas meeting would be complete without some of Ian's magic.

The presentations were completed by Martin Siddle with Robey the robot that was

a toy from his younger days that could walk, a forerunner of some of the sophisticated toys available now.

A very interesting series of presentations that rounded off the year 2023 and our time at St Firmin's Church Hall.

Eric Cooper proposed a "thank you" to Malcolm Scriven, our Group Leader, for his work in organising this year's events that was rightly supported by all present and then we moved on to the Horseshoe for Christmas Lunch.


#### **Poetry Group**
