Chairman's Chat

One of the things I loved about teaching was meeting remarkable young men and women who taught me as much as I taught them. One, that sticks in my mind is Sarah Outen. I never taught Sarah but worked with her when she came back from university to help out supervising Duke of Edinburgh expeditions. Sarah had an infectiously positive outlook and boundless energy. She was also something of a restless spirit and was looking for a challenge after graduating from university. She decided to become the first woman to row the Indian Ocean.

The D of E team experienced a jaw-dropping moment when we learned of her plans and that was followed by many heart-stopping moments as we followed her progress across the ocean, from escaping treacherous currents around the Australian coast, through violent storms, to a dramatic and dangerous arrival in Madagascar. She survived the experience but had a taste for adventure and decided to follow up by circumnavigating the globe entirely by human power.

To go around the world, she kayaked down the Thames and across the Channel, cycled across Europe and Asia, kayaked to Japan and then rowed across the Pacific before cycling across North America. In the end, she was defeated by violent storms and exhaustion as she tried to row across the Atlantic, but it is an epic story and truly heroic. In one of her blogs during the round the world trip she talked about the adventures that ordinary people could have. Not everybody has the time or inclination to row an ocean, but we can all do something out of the ordinary. We can have our own micro-adventure. In my case, it is walking the South West Coast Path in bite sized chunks, but it can be anything that you do not usually do and just nudges you beyond your comfort zone. It could be something as simple as exploring a new route to walk into town or going to Peterborough on the bus rather than in the car. It does not matter what it is as long as it is something you have not done before and are not sure about.

Having a micro-adventure strikes me as a very good thing to do. It's making yourself experience something new. You might not like it – in which case, don't do it again. On the other hand, it might open a whole new world to you. Either way, new experiences might tell you something about yourself and your capabilities. It doesn't matter how old or unfit you are or how trivial the challenge might seem to others. The key is to go and do something – anything – that is different and just a little bit challenging to test your mettle. Go on, make 2020 the year you have a micro-adventure. Happy New Year everybody.

The sheep get up and make their many tracks and bear a load of snow upon their backs, and gnaw the frozen turnip to the ground with sharp quick bite, and then go nosing round the boy that pecks the turnips all the day and knocks his hands to keep the cold away and laps his legs in straw to keep them warm and hides beneath the hedges from the storm.

The sheep, as tame as dogs, go where he goes and try to shake their fleeces from the snow, then leave their frozen meal and wander round the stubble stack that stands beside the ground, and lie all night and face the drizzling storm and shun the hovel where they might be warm.
