"Spirit Of Sandringham" The B17 Steam Locomotive Trust

Event Details: Wednesday 3 November 2021

Time - 2.00pm

Venue - Wake House, Bourne

The Trust is building a full-size working example of a London North Eastern Railway B17 Express Passenger Locomotive for use on the National Network and Heritage Railways. It is being built using traditional engineering skills and offers training for people in apprenticeships.

Mr Brian Hall, Chairman of the above Trust has agreed to give a presentation covering the objectives, organisation, manufacturing, construction, fund raising initiatives, videos and finally Q's and A's.

The B17 is one of several "New Build" Steam Locomotives being built in the UK with "Tornado", built five years ago, probably the most well-known.

Anytime Out Group.

The Group have just had their first day out since the beginning of lockdown last year and what a wonderful day it was!! 27 people left Bourne at 9.00am Thursday September 23rd to visit the National Memorial Arboretum at Lichfield. The day was grey at 9 but by 10 the sun had come out and stayed with us turning into a wonderful Indian Summers Day. We arrived at 11a.m in time to join the 10-minute service of remembrance and then we went three different ways.

The largest group went on the land train which is an hour's journey around the site with recorded information. Half a dozen people spent the day on their own wandering around and 5 of us went on a buggy with a driver guide who was so knowledgeable and wonderful to listen to because of all the history he was telling us. Not just about the events that the memorials were showing us but actual stories about people who the memorials were about.

The youngest lad "shot at dawn" for deserting his post was only seventeen and a half but he had said he was 18. He was one of 349 men shot. Each one has a pole with his name and the date of execution in a beautiful but extremely sad grove where the sun comes up first on this incredible place of memories.

HMS Neptune was sunk when it hit two land mines and the crew of 750 were all lost except for one man whose Father had taught him to play Water Polo. He held on to a raft which had four severely injured men on it but each of those died over a week. A day later he was rescued and taken back to England. After two weeks he was sent on to another ship which was also sunk but again he survived. Then he was sent to the Korean War.

Talk about a cat with 9 lives!!

The incredible memorials are to people killed and things damaged in various places of war. The largest memorial - walls upon which are the names of those who have been killed in wars since the Second World war and will sadly, be added to in the future. The site is huge and cannot all be seen in one day. Whilst this is a site of remembrance it is also a site of celebration of lives well lived. The amazing memorials and beautiful grounds make visitors feel welcome. We sat there in total amazement when the sun actually showed through the sheets of glass showing the shadow of a warship, It was beautiful.

Wine Tasting Group 3

Nine members attended this meeting held at a member's home.

The wines were chosen to accompany a fish pie.

We tasted three chilled white wines. The first was a Chablis, a lovely balanced wine not too dry, fruity with a smooth texture and good body. We were served sushi with this, which was a real treat. The second wine was a South African Chenin Blanc . A medium dry wine with a crisp, fruity taste. It was served with taramasalata to dip in. A good match to the creamier food. The final wine was an Italian Soave. It was not too dry , medium to light body with a good aftertaste. We drank this with tasty cod bites. It was a lighter wine which could easily be drunk on its own.

The wines were all purchased from Lidl at very reasonable prices. The Chablis had the higher alcohol content and the Soave the lowest. All of them worked well with the food. The evening was completed with lots of chat, catching up with each other after so long being unable to meet.
